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# Learning Objectives



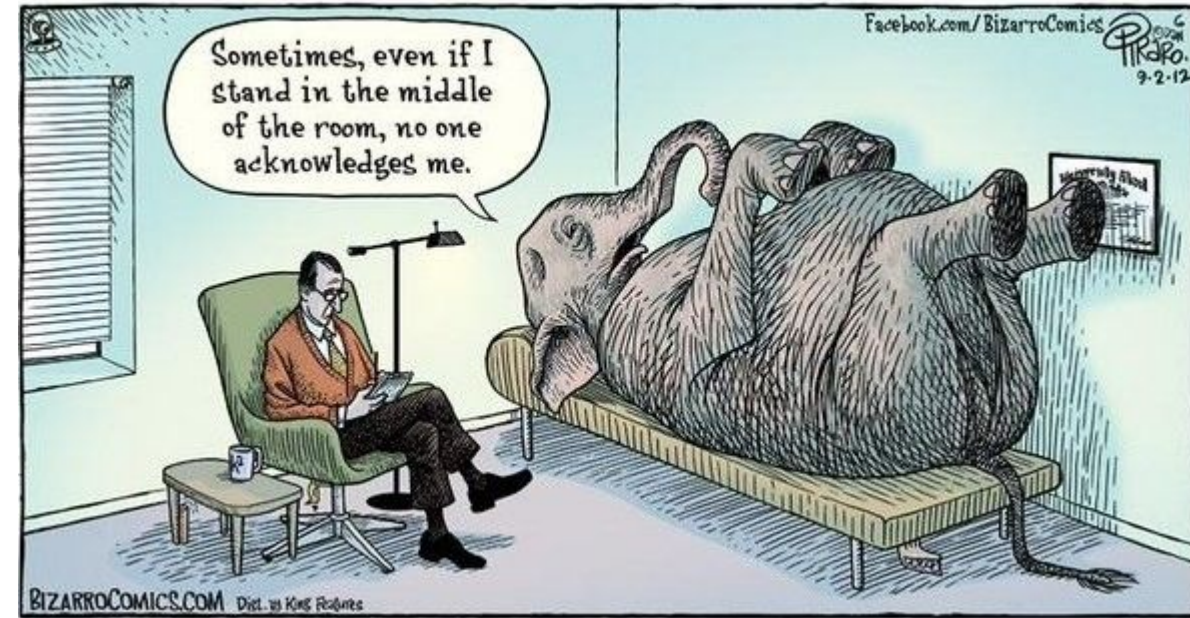
1. To better understand the connection between porn literacy and media literacy;

- How can we weave in conversation around what young people may be experiencing if they are tuning into online SEM/porn?

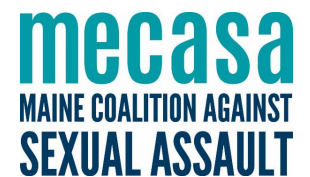

# The Landscape

- Young people are accessing porn.
- Can we safely address porn in sexual health education?
- Can we be objective about porn?
- Fear-based approach further guilts/shames youth.
- Pornography shapes and is also shaped by culture.
- What is porn? “I know it when I see it”



# Youth accessing porn



Nearly **3 in 4** teen respondents (73%) have been exposed to pornography, either accidentally or on purpose.



**12** is the average age when children first consumed pornography.

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# What do youth think?

- Porn is a normal part of their lives.
- They do not not think porn is harmful.
- They still feel shame/guilt about watching it.
- Their values often conflict with what they see.
- They don't talk about it with others.

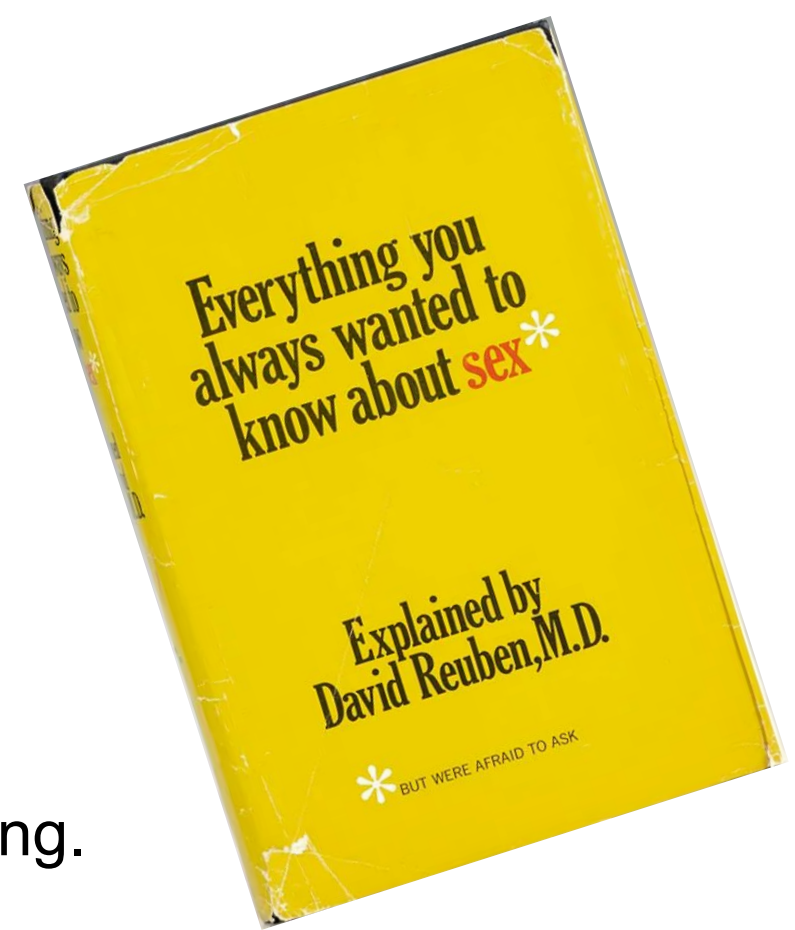
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# What they learn from porn

- How to have sex.
- What types of people they're attracted to.
- Sexual behaviors they may be interested in trying.
- Human bodies and anatomy.
- Sexual behaviors that may/may not be pleasurable.

# Debrief

Young people watching porn may find it a turn on/stimulating, even if what they're watching may conflict with their own values/relationships.

If they have nowhere to process what they see, this can lead to:

- Feelings of shame
- Misrepresentation of what bodies can do or look like
- Beliefs around what sexual acts are common or desired
- Lack of role modeling around consent and safer sex practices

# Strategies

Integrate into what you're already doing:

- Align with Maine health education standards
- Media literacy more broadly
- Sexual health topics:
  - anatomy
  - safer sex practices
  - consent/communication

# Strategies

Model for Responding:

- Communication
- Empathy
- Accountability

These are protective factors for healthy development.



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# Strategies

- Stay calm
- Don't ignore the behavior
- Avoid shaming and victim blaming language
- Avoid probing questions
- Redirect when you can (child - child)
